

There are thousands of children, young adults, and frail old people too, who need the invention, skill, and loving care of DEMAND. But to create these little miracles they need our money.



#### Michael Willis, Chairman of DEMAND

DEMAND (Design and Manufacture for Disability) is a practical charity that attempts to create what we call "equality of life" for disabled people. Our annual review offers an insight into our work in 2006 as well as recording the achievements of 2005 (our 25th Anniversary year.) As such it is a vital part of our fundraising activity.

DEMAND helps disabled individuals by designing and manufacturing equipment to meet their specific needs in a variety of ways:

Satisfying basic needs such as mobility, seating, bathing and feeding.

Accelerating recovery following a disabling injury.

Providing opportunities that otherwise would not have been possible.

mmercial concerns and government sources provide equipment for disabled people, but inevitably tend to operate where clear evidence of a large need is apparent. This leaves many thousands of disabled people with individual needs without an off the shelf source of equipment - and this is the gap that DEMAND exists to fill.

In our 25th anniversary year we exceeded the targets we set ourselves for the number of people assisted in what has continued to be a difficult financial climate. We wish to continue to increase these numbers, but how much we achieve is directly linked to the donations we receive. To all who supported us during 2005 I express our heartfelt thanks. Our future success depends on continuing support.

In 2006 we enter a new era for the charity. Studies in 2005 concluded that the best way for us to help more disabled people was to open another branch in a new area. Work on this new venture has already started and our aim is to be operational by 1st July 2006.

To all who are interested in our activities we extend a warm welcome for you to visit DEMAND to see for yourselves the quality and variety of work we undertake.

In the UK over 10 million people have disabilities, 15% of the population, and this number is growing. Where there is a large scale, common need for equipment to meet their needs this is met by public and private sectors. However, support to meet **individual** needs is often unavailable or financially inaccessible.

#### How we Help

DEMAND provides solutions when no other help is available. The equipment we make is supplied free of charge to individuals, though we always welcome a donation. The number and variety of requests we receive grows year on year. We have two primary objectives, firstly to design and manufacture equipment for disabled people where no off-the-shelf solution exists, and secondly to encourage design for disability.

This Annual Review describes some of the projects we undertook in fulfilling the first objective, and the work of students we support in fulfilling the second. In achieving our objectives we also provide a range of services from which hundreds of people benefit.

#### Helpline: 01923 681800

When individuals ring to discuss their requirements, our design team's knowledge enables them to provide advice and contacts for existing sources of equipment. Many callers are helped this way.

#### Assessment

If there is no off-the-shelf equipment to satisfy a caller's requirements, our design team will arrange a visit to fully assess their needs. This is done in conjunction with their parent/helpers, their physio/occupational therapists, and the individual themselves.

#### Projects

Our designers translate the outcome of assessments into manufacturable solutions, each of which is given a unique project number. Our projects fall into two categories. 20% enable participation in sporting and leisure activities ("opportunity" projects) whilst 80% make everyday living easier and safer.

#### Refurbishment


We often get requests to help with equipment that has been in use for many years but for which support is no longer available. Wear and tear inevitably takes its toll and our craftsmen refurbish the equipment and return items 'as good as new'.

#### Modification

We can tailor equipment designed to meet a generic need, to the specific needs of an individual.

#### Repair

When equipment fails, the normal procedure is for the original manufacturer to repair it. However, if that manufacturer no longer exists, a good solution may be lost. DEMAND can help in many cases.






#### **FES Rowing**



Professor Brian Andrews, a founder and associate of the DEMAND Forum, is conducting research into Functional Electrical Stimulation (FES) of the leg muscles of paraplegics to enable the use of rowing machines. Early work suggests that "whole body" exercise will produce benefits to general health and life expectancy. Bespoke kits were made to enable paraplegic rowers to compete in the National Indoor Rowing Championships in 2005 and further trials are planned.

# The Greenpower Challenge

he Greenpower Challenge exists to encourage school children's interest in engineering through the design and construction of electrically (green) powered racing cars. Once built the children then prove their cars in regional races and a national final at Goodwood. The races are 6 hour endurance tests with the winner being the car which travelled the most miles. DEMAND designed adaptations that enable disabled children to npete.



#### Katie's Ski Tracks

Katie's Ski Tracks is a small charity that each year provides groups of disabled children with a skiing experience. They asked DEMAND to design something which would enable children with limited lower body strength to ski upright. The ski frame we made supports the child and can be steered by the user, making it safe and a lot of fun.




#### Supportive chair for Jack

Jack is 5 years old and has Spina Bifida. He attends a mainstream primary school where he uses a floor sitter and a chair with side supports to ensure that he sits with the correct posture. Jack had grown out of the chair he was previously using, so we were asked to make a wider chair. DEMAND adapted a larger school chair by adding side supports and an adjustable footrest so that Jack can sit at the correct height for the school tables and maintain good posture.



Tanya is 22 and has Rett Syndrome, a progressive degenerative disease which affects girls only. She also has epilepsy. Tanya attends a day centre. She needed a chair to enable her to sit at a table with the other centre users, to eat & participate in other activities. DEMAND adapted one of the centre's chairs to increase its stability and enable the staff to push her up to the table and around the centre without her having to be taken out of the chair.





# Buggy board for Charlotte

Charlotte has Brittle Bone Disease. She is 6 years old and uses a wheelchair and is unable to propel herself. She has a lively 2 year old younger sister, Lauren. When their mother takes them out, she has difficulty keeping them both under safe control. They needed a buggy board for Lauren to stand on, but those available, intended for use on baby buggies were not suitable for use on a wheelchair. DEMAND made a buggy board which was robust and able to fit the wheelchair as well as having an anti-tip mechanism, to prevent the buggy tipping if stood on while the chair was empty.

#### Dining aid for Mark

Mark is in his 30's. He has Severe Learning Difficulties which encompasses multiple physical and mental disabilities. He lives in sheltered accommodation and needs a high degree of care. When seated at the table, to eat or engage in other activities, he slumps over with his face close to the surface. His physiotherapist was concerned that this would cause permanent postural damage. DEMAND made a raised platform with a cut-out to fit around his chest, which raises the height of Mark's head and arms so that his back is much straighter when he is sitting. The table-top platform can be disassembled transporting and has adjustments to enable it to be fitted to a wide range of tables.





#### Shower/bathing aid for David

David is 11 and has Cerebral Palsy. DEMAND modified his shower chair some years ago to provide him with extra support that he needed. Now he is older, he has been provided with a larger shower chair/commode which DEMAND adapted to make it suitable for David to use.

# Gangplank for June

June is in her 60's and has arthritis and a hernia. She lives on a narrowboat and very much likes the lifestyle. The gangplank she used for access was typical of the type used on these boats, made up of two solid wooden planks, linked so they can be folded and stored on a rack on top of the boat. As it became more difficult for her to handle this gangplank she had reached the point where she would have to give up living on the boat. DEMAND made a lightweight gangplank, made up of two pieces which could be separated to avoid having to lift the whole weight at one time. The two parts clip securely together when in use to provide a wide walking surface and also provided with an anti-slip coating for safe use in wet weather.



#### Over Bed Mirror

The DEMAND Over Bed Mirror is produced to enable patients immobilised in a supine position to be able to see the world around them - and not just the ceiling. It is easy to manoeuvre and adjust, making it popular with nursing staff. The benefit to the patient is that it helps break their feeling of isolation - with proven benefits to recovery.



We have recently started manufacturing these mirrors in response to requests from spinal injury units and ITU's.


# The DEMAND Neurological Chair




The DEMAND Neurological Chair is designed for the rehabilitation of patients, with neurological and other conditions, who require seating positions and postural control unobtainable from conventional seating. Correct positioning can also alleviate stiffening of the joints, deformities, and the impairment of other tions including breathing and digestion.

#### The DEMAND Neurological chair features:

- A wide range of adjustability enabling support wherever it is required.
- Suitability for a wide range of heights and weights.
- Comfortable padding on the seat to alleviate pressure sores.



This simple little device enables a child, who normally needs help to support themselves in a sitting position,



#### **Future Development**

Our overall aim is to help as many disabled people as possible, and during 2005 the Trustees looked at ways of increasing the numbers of people we are able to help. After some detailed research it was concluded that the best way of achieving this was to expand geographically, specifically by opening another branch of the charity in the north.

This area was chosen because it would enhance DEMAND's capabilities and as our Forum partners, BIME and MERU are based in the south of England, there is a greater need for our services further north. The region selected was the M62 corridor, given that this area provides access to a very large population within a relatively small area.

Towards the end of 2005 we recruited Martin Brown to become the General Manager of this new branch.

Our target is to recruit a small team of designers and craftsmen, equip the premises with design and manufacturing equipment, establish a customer base, and become operational in the area by 1st July 2006.

The branch will use the administrative support of Abbots Langley to minimise overheads. It is hoped to attract sufficient local funding to enable the number of designers and craftsmen to increase in the first 3 years with the objective of increasing the overall number of projects DEMAND undertakes by 60%.

This new branch must be able to support itself financially, and we will be working hard to raise donations to ensure its success. We will welcome visitors to the new facility once established, and any enquiries can be referred to the team at Abbots Langley.

#### **Outcome Measures**

One of the most difficult tasks we have is quantifying the benefits that our projects bring. Subjectively we know they are all very worthwhile, but it would be very helpful to be able to explain HOW worthwhile, and to be sure that we have achieved the improvements we set out to achieve. With this in mind Forum members agreed to share the cost of a seminar at

which guest speakers would present alternative methods of measuring performance through outcome measures. None of the methods matched the work that we do accurately, but all had elements that could be considered for use in our work. Each member organisation has nominated a representative to take this work forward and the intention is to derive a simple but useful way of quantifying the benefits we achieve.

#### Charter

Chief Executives of each organisation we recognised that continuity would best be served by a more formal agreement between members. However we did not want to embark on a lengthy or expensive process so, with advice from Lloyds TSB Foundation for England and Wales, we drafted a simple Charter that explains why we feel working together is worthwhile, and commits each organisation to continued support. Irrespective of the personalities at the helm of each organisation in the future we hope this will be the foundation for continued support.

#### Fundraiser's Forum

One slightly unexpected success story of Forum activities has been the meeting and cooperation achieved between members fundraisers. At face value these individuals might be perceived as being in competition with one another for scarce funds, but in practice the sources of funding are different and it was interesting to see that there were several areas that all organisations would like to explore and learn more about. This team are developing ideas to present to a meeting of the Forum CEOs with the aim of making us all more successful in attracting funds, thus achieving our aim of "helping each other help more disabled people".

## University Support '04/05



From August 2004 to July 2005 Stephanie Osman was on placement from Nottingham Trent University. In the early stages of 2005 she:



Designed a stool for Mrs Stone to enable her to get in and out of her seat easier. The seat was made with extra width to accommodate for the way Mrs Stone uses the seat due to Arthritis.



Designed a free-standing boccia ramp for Treloar school



In October 2005 Will Marsh contacted DEMAND concerning his final year project at Bath University. He asked DEMAND to make his Mono Ski which he designed for Talan Skeels-Piggins:



In this final year engineering project an existing mono-ski, used by the British Adaptive Ski Team, was analysed and redesigned in order to improve the reliability and performance of the unit. Using computer simulation and experimental measurement a new mono-ski was designed that had improved geometry, a rising rate suspension system to enhance handling, increased ground clearance and reduced mass.



The result, was a titanium and aluminium frame, with a special shock absorber from a racing snow mobile that provides "rising rate" and a huge range of adjustment.



The new design was built by DEMAND in readiness for the 2006 Winter Paralympics.

The mono-ski was tested by Talan in the Milton Keynes Snow Dome.



## University Support '05/06





From September 2005 to July 2006 Sam Bairstow and John Neale are on placement from Brunel and De Montfort Universities. In the latter stages of 2005 they have completed a range of projects including the following:




-2005 became the year for boccia ramps! "Boccia" is basically bowls and the name is derived from the Italian word "Bocce" meaning ramp. Boccia is a sport based on court boundaries and has complicated rules. Players are divided into different categories of disability to ensure fair competition.



We have been designing ramps for individuals from Treloar school. The ramps are supported by a sub frame which is manipulated by a ramp assistant as directed by the player. The ramps have been tailored to accommodate the needs and preferences of individual players and ramp assistants.



We have finalised a design that uses flexible plastic running down the ramp which creates a smooth transition for the ball from ramp to floor which greatly increases the shot consistency.




This has led to a generic design — that could be the ramp for everyone's needs.



The "ski-trainer" is a device to aid skiers who are learning to ski and or have limited motor control in one or both of their legs. They might know how to ski but can't actually transmit a signal to make their legs do as they're told. The instructor can manipulate the poles to simulate the ski turn so the trainee can feel the required movement. Hopefully after practice the trainer poles can be removed and the person can ski on their own. This prototype will be used by Katie's Ski

Tracks in 2006.


